

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Director's Notes

Depublic Pictures' copyright on Frank **N**Capra's 1946 film, It's a Wonderful Life, expired in 1974. Soon thereafter, budget conscious local television stations across the country undertook repeated airings of the film each holiday season, royalty free. Although It's a Wonderful Life was not very successful in its 1946 theatrical release, the popularity of this lifeaffirming story steadily grew through the 1970s and 1980s, thanks to the film's ubiquitous television presence. In the mid-1990s, Republic reasserted its copyright and limited the release of It's a Wonderful Life to annual airings on NBC. By then, the film had become a renowned and beloved holiday classic.

I am among those who love the film, and when RVP asked me if I would be interested in directing a holiday show this season, I immediately replied, "Is there a stage version of It's a Wonderful Life?" I had forgotten that there is one - Joe Landry's radio play version has been entertaining holiday audiences since it first was produced almost 20 years ago. We began planning right away! Not only was I thrilled about the chance to work with the RVP team to tell this beautiful story, I was equally excited by the opportunity that this particular version provides for us to share with the audience what we do backstage. As you will see, the activity behind the scenes is as complex and fascinating as that which appears in front of the proverbial curtain.

The casts of most productions of It's a Wonderful Life: A Live Radio Play enjoy the assistance of an onstage Foley artist who performs most, if not all, of the sound effects and music cues, leaving the actors free to focus on performing the characters and telling the story. Having myself performed with school tour programs, as well as in many plays with San Francisco's Word for Word, where actors often get to perform backstage effects in addition to playing multiple characters in show, I asked RVP if we could cast this production without the Foley artist, but instead with flexible, talented actors capable of performing all the sound effects and music themselves. "Go for it!" was Steve Price's trusting response.

I am beholden to our immensely gifted cast, our imaginative and creative designers and consultants, our stalwart crew, and our unfailingly gracious producer for their steadfast dedication and patience.

Thus, we present you with the wellknown and beloved story of a person who rejects his value to his community, only to have his heart and soul buoyed by the love of that very community. It's a Wonderful Life inspires us, during this holiday season, to always cherish the reality that we depend on each other, and we need each other.

Happy holidays to you, to those you love and to those who love you.
